

Karen Norberg is an epidemiologist and child psychiatrist with long-standing interest in applications of econometric methods and behavioral economics to demography and public health. She received her MD from Harvard Medical School, and began her recent transition to epidemiology and health policy research through affiliation with the National Bureau of Economic Research. She was the recipient of an NIMH career development award for the study of adolescent suicide, and served on a National Research Council Panel to study data and research relating to firearms. She is currently working on the Health Outcomes study, sponsored through Washington University's Center for Health Policy, studying the effects of employer-based health insurance policies on health outcomes, and collaborating with genetic epidemiologists in the Department of Psychiatry on studies pertaining to the interplay of genetic and environmental influences on child and adolescent behavior and adult outcomes.
