

Harry J. Holzer, Ph.D.

Harry J. Holzer is a professor of public policy at Georgetown University, and a visiting fellow at the Urban Institute in Washington DC. He is a former chief economist for the U.S. Department of Labor, and a former professor of economics at Michigan State University. He received his A.B. from Harvard in 1978, and his Ph.D. in economics from Harvard in 1983. He is a senior affiliate of the National Poverty Center at the University of Michigan, and a research affiliate of the Institute for Research on Poverty at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He is also a nonresident senior fellow with the Brookings Metropolitan Policy Program, and a member of the editorial board at the *Journal of Policy Analysis and Management*.

Dr. Holzer's research has focused primarily on the labor market problems of low-wage workers and other disadvantaged groups. His books include *The Black Youth Employment Crisis* (co-edited with Richard Freeman, University of Chicago Press, 1986); *What Employers Want: Job Prospects for Less-Educated Workers* (Russell Sage Foundation, 1996); *Employers and Welfare Recipients: The Effects of Welfare Reform in the Workplace* (with Michael Stoll, Public Policy Institute of California, 2001); *Moving Up or Moving On: Who Advances in the Low-Wage Labor Market* (with Fredrik Andersson and Julia Lane), Russell Sage Foundation, 2005; *Reconnecting Disadvantaged Young Men* (with Peter Edelman and Paul Offner), Urban Institute Press, 2006; and *Reshaping the American Workforce in a Changing Economy* (co-edited with Demetra Nightingale), Urban Institute Press, 2007.
