

J. Bradford Jensen serves as deputy director at the Institute for International Economics. The Institute is a private, nonprofit, nonpartisan research institution devoted to the study of international economic policy. Prior to joining the Institute in 2003, Dr. Jensen served as director of the Center for Economic Studies, a research institute within the U.S. Bureau of the Census, where he directed the Center's research program, managed its Research Data Center network, and supervised its relationships with collaborating universities and research organizations.

He was a research economist at the Census Bureau from 1993 to 1997. He moved to Pittsburgh in 1997 to become executive director of the Carnegie Mellon Census Research Data Center at Carnegie Mellon University as well as serve on the faculty at the H. John Heinz III School of Public Policy and Management there. He returned to Washington in 1999 to direct the Center for Economic Studies and serve as adjunct associate professor at the University of Maryland.

Dr. Jensen pioneered the use of plant-level microdata to investigate the impact of international trade and investment on the U.S. economy. His recent work examines the relationship between firm performance and increased trade with low-wage countries and the relationship between multinational ownership and plant survival. His work has been published in the *American Economic Review*, *Review of Economics and Statistics*, *Journal of International Economics*, *Brookings Paper on Economic Activity*, and *Harvard Business Review*. Jensen's research has been cited in popular press publications including the *Economist*, *Wall Street Journal*, *Fortune*, and *Business Week*.

Dr. Jensen received his Ph.D. in Economics from Stanford University and B.A. from Kalamazoo College.
