Lori G. Kletzer is Professor of Economics at the University of California, Santa Cruz, and a non-resident Senior Fellow at the Institute for International Economics. She received her Ph.D. in economics from the University of California, Berkeley, and her BA from Vassar College. She has held teaching and research appointments at Williams College, the University of Washington, the Brookings Institution, and the Institute for International Economics. In addition to her research on the domestic labor market effects of globalization, her research has focused on the causes and consequences of job displacement, job training, racial differences in the incidence of job loss, and the microeconomics of college choice, careers, and wages. Her publications appear in a number of professional journals, including *American Economic Review*, *Journal of Economic Perspectives*, *Industrial and Labor Relations Review*, and *Industrial Relations*. She is the author of two recently published books: *Job Loss from Imports: Measuring the Costs*, a study of the costs to workers of trade-related job loss, published by the Institute for International Economics in 2001, and *Imports, Exports, and Jobs: What does trade mean for employment and job loss?*, an industry-level study of the link between trade and employment and job loss for the U.S. manufacturing sector, published by the W.E. Upjohn Institute for Employment Research in 2002.

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
