### **New Questions and Answers**

Q. I have an author with (let's say) the last name St. James and am having a hard time figuring out the correct form for her bibliography entry. Is it correct to write St. James, Bertha? Or James, St. Bertha? HELP!!

A. Having the surname St. James doesn't make one Saint James—or Saint Bertha; Bertha's surname starts with S.

Q. If words in parentheses would turn a singular subject into a plural subject, should the verb (outside the parentheses) be plural? I'm wondering specifically whether "applies" should be "apply" in this sentence: A case such as this illustrates a broader category in which justice (and, therefore, injustice) no longer applies.

A. Your sentence is correct as written. Parenthetical content should not leach into the syntax of the containing sentence. If the information is so important that you feel it shouldn't be ignored, take it out of parentheses: A case such as this illustrates a broader category in which justice and injustice no longer apply.

Q. My organization holds a lot of events, and we refer to them often on our website and in our member newsletter. Some are large programs (Last Remaining Seats film series); others are one-time events (Haunted Scavenger Hunt). In trying to determine how to format event titles, the closest comparison I found in CMOS was titles of exhibitions, which should be italicized (our events are more like museum exhibitions than world's fairs). Would you agree that we should italicize all events, regardless of their size or duration?

A. Exhibitions are a special exception in CMOS because often they include a published catalog of the same title, and the confusion seemed to cause endless difficulty for writers. Your events are perhaps more akin to sporting events (8.77), courses of study (8.85), or even holidays (8.88), so style them as you did in your query, with headline caps. If some events are lectures (8.86), you can put quotation marks around their titles.

Q. I accessed a website regularly during the course of my research and noted the dates of that access. Today, as I am finalizing the notes and bibliography, I find that the website was removed! Thus, the link is no longer good or active. Is there a way you'd like to see this handled?

A. All you can do is note that you accessed it on a certain date. You're all set.

Q. Can you please confirm the correct spelling of "TIME magazine"? CMOS 8.169 has Time magazine. However, TIME customer service tells me that TIME Magazine is correct. I think "magazine" should be lowercased, since it does not appear anywhere on the cover, and I do not think it is part of the official name of the magazine, even though they capitalize it on their website. What do you think?

A. We're sticking with Time magazine. One of the best things about having a style guide is not having to phone every organization in a document and talk to customer service; instead, we use the style manual to present titles consistently. Even if you were to check the periodical itself, you might find that the magazine cover has one spelling (TIME) but the copyright information has another (Time) and yet another is used in running text (Time). And you know for sure that if you phoned again, a different rep would give you a different answer.


